Israel kills over 200 Palestinians in central Gaza

Israel has carried out another cold-blooded massacre in the Gaza Strip killing more than 200 Palestinians in airstrikes in central Gaza.

The airstrikes targeted the Nuseirat refugee camp and other parts of central Gaza.

Hundreds of other people have also been wounded.

Most of the victims are women and children. The Ministry of Health in Gaza said "large numbers" of killed and wounded were arriving at Al-Aqsa

Martyrs Hospital, the majority of whom are children "Dozens of injured people are lying on the ground, and medical teams are trying to save them with the basic medical capabilities they have available," it said, Al Jazeera

The ministry said it is short on medicine and food, and that its main generator has stopped functioning due to

In a short statement, the Israeli military said its forces hit Hamas infrastructure in the area of Nuseirat. The military later announced its forces rescued four captives during the operation in Nuseirat.

Ex-Mossad official: Hezbollah missiles could paralyze entire Israel

The former head of Mossad's Intelligence division has warned Israel against the consequences of a full-scale war with Lebanon's Hezbollah resistance movement.

In an interview with the Israeli newspaper Haaretz, Haim Tomer, discussed the implications of continuing the fight in Gaza and expanding the campaign in the north.

According to Tomer, "entering a broad campaign in Lebanon now, after eight months of fighting in Gaza, significantly risks Israel's ability to function as a state with an economy, society, and international

"The public must understand that an all-out war threatens Israel's Zionist vision," he said.

Tomer said that Hezbollah could paralyze the entire country by launching thousands of missiles.

The Lebanese Resistance movement poses "an unprecedented threat" that the Israeli army cannot counter, the former official said.

"They have precision missiles that can destroy Israel's gas fields in seconds.

U.S. silencing pro-Palestine voices

TEHRAN - In the so-called land of the free, it appears that freedom of speech has its limits in America when TV presenters criticize the Israeli war on Gaza.

The United States has been fueling the Israeli air and ground assault on Gaza's 2.2 million population through many different measures.

Apart from arms shipments to Tel Aviv that are being dropped on civilians in Gaza as well as diplomatic and political backing, news coverage of the war in the mainstream media has been accused of being very onesided in support of the Israeli occupation regime.

It may therefore not have come as a surprise when the Washington-based news outlet, The Hill, fired Briahna Joy Gray, the co-host of a daily morning show.

The presenter has been a vocal critic of the Israeli narrative surrounding the events on October 7, and has repeatedly condemned the mass slaughter of women and children in Gaza

Iran calls on D-8 nations to sever ties with Israel

TEHRAN - Iran's Acting Foreign Minister Ali Bagheri Kani has called on member states of the Developing Eight (D-8) Organization for Economic Cooperation to sever all economic and political ties with Israel to pressure it to cease its aggression in the Gaza Strip.

His remarks were made during an extraordinary meeting of D-8 foreign ministers held in Istanbul, Turkey, on Saturday.

During his address, Bagheri Kani condemned the ongoing atrocities committed by Israel against the Palestinian people. He urged Islamic countries to take decisive action, including cutting off all relations with Israel, to end the violence in Gaza.

Bagheri Kani emphasized that Israel will only acknowledge the gravity of the situation when confronted ▶ Page 3

The enemy's political resolutions do not affect Iran's economy

In the following column, we take a look at some important contents and views in yesterday's Iranian newspapers.

In an analysis, Kayhan discussed the approval of a new resolution against Iran by the Europeans and quoted Zahir Esfahani, an economic analyst, as saying: According to economic experts, America has no more excuses to use against Iran, and the enemy is unable in any kind of new pressure and sanctions against Iran. Unlike the previous periods, it seems that America does not agree with the policies of issuing a resolution against Iran.

The purpose of this resolution is to increase political pressure on Iran because Iran is on the verge of elections and anti-Iranian resolutions will not cause the markets to be inflamed. In this situation where the most important issue of Iran's foreign policy is the nuclear issue, the West wants to put pressure on Iran and give signs to both the Iranian people and the elected president in order to change the political, economic, and social approach towards the goals of the West in the next four years. In the last three years, Iran has shown that it will not pay any ransom to foreign governments.

Arman-e-Melli: killing the JCPOA or the "birth of the new JCPOA"?

In a note, Arman-e-Melli investigated the aims of the West in issuing a resolution against Iran in the IAEA and wrote: It seems that the Europeans and the Americans are looking for a multifaceted project in a joint action against Iran by playing games with American think tanks. Upon political pressure, they want to call Iran a JCPOA violator and make the snapback mechanism ineffective in October 2025 so that they can implement the sanctions against our

It seems that the Westerners are trying to manage multifaceted pressure against Iran by using the snapback mechanism and by threatening our country to be placed under Chapter 7 of Article 42 of the Security Council, to persuade Tehran to think about a new JCPOA. Of course, Iran will only think of its interests, and the indirect negotiations that Iran had with the Americans in Doha in the past indicate that Iran's hand will not be closed in this American and European scenario against our country.

Iran: Globalization of resistance discourse

In an interview with political sociologist Dr. Ali Entezari, the Iran newspaper addressed the Leader's recent letter to American students supporting Palestine. It wrote: In this letter, the Leader introduces the "resistance front" as transnational. This means that the resis-

tance front is not only limited to West Asia and Islamic countries but covers the whole world. The world order is an order based on oppression and injustice, and the Western world uses political, military, and even intellectual tools for domination and repression in order to establish its order over the world. That is why this letter is a "hopeful letter".

He promises the pro-Palestinian students that the discourse based on "world order" is declining and will be replaced by "resistance discourse".

This is a true promise given by the Leader because this discourse is not for a specific territory. It is integrated and manifested in the whole world. With the focus on religion and the Quran, it will become the basis for the collapse of the oppressive system. Therefore, according to the existing world order that dominates the world, due to the resistance it creates, it also causes the revival of competing poles.

Sobh-e-No: The evil of the West against Iran has an internal strategy

In a commentary, Sobh-e-No discussed the recent anti-Iranian resolution. The paper said: Despite all the developments, some believe that this resolution follows another strategy apart from diplomatic issues, and that is an internal strategy to express the interference of the countries behind this resolution in Iran's elections

The Board of Governors of the International Atomic Energy Agency issued its anti-Iranian resolution on the eve of the presidential elections in order to prevent participation in the elections by instilling fear in the society and scaring people from the shadow of war and sanctions

It can be said that this resolution has an internal usage and an electoral signal to the Western-oriented faction, and its issuers are looking for the end of the path of honorable diplomacy that was formed by martyr Raisi and Amir Abdollahian in the 13th government.

This claim is not far from the truth, and we have seen the efforts of the ambassadors and statesmen of these European countries to interfere in the country's issues in the past years. The activities of the German and English ambassadors were evident in 1401(2022), and now they are considering the opportunity for a new action and a hybrid operation against the participation and electoral unity of the people.

Shortly after the beginning of the regime's onslaughts against Palestinians in the besieged enclave, Biazar's account was removed by X without prior warnings. The journalist opened up a new account, where he shared videos of anti-Israel demonstrations in France and also raised awareness about the plight of Palestinians at the hands of the regime's cruel military.

"The arrest of an Iranian national by the French police over his support for the oppressed people of Palestine is another disgrace for France in the field of human rights," Kazem Gharibabadi, the secretary of Iran's High Council for Human Rights, wrote on X on Wednesday.

"Yesterday, I spoke with his spouse and the officials of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs; we're determined to defend our compatriots. This Iranian national must be freed as soon as possible," he said.Iran's Foreign Ministry spokesman Nasser Kanaani also commented on Biazar's arrest.

"Right after finding out [about the Iranian national's arrest], the Ministry of Foreign Affairs put pursuing and



[ensuring] respect for the rights of this citizen and his most immediate release on its agenda," the official said in a statement.

Biazar's pinned post on his X account displays him during a United Nations session where he was given the chance to detail the impact of Western sanctions on Iranian society, UN inaction in regards to the sanctions, as well as the humanitarian situation in Gaza based on his findings. The journalist's statements about Israeli crimes against humanity were met with multiple rounds of applause from other speakers and widely shared on different social media

Silencing dissent against Israel

Washington and European states have worked in tandem in the past 8 months to muzzle any form of criti-

cism against Israel.

The regime has killed over 36,000 civilians and razed the majority of Gaza to the ground, since a successful Palestinian operation deep inside the occupied territories on October 7th. It has targeted hospitals, schools, homes, mosques, and churches all across the enclave, and built mass graves in some areas to conceal its killing of civilians.

The situation in Gaza is being characterized as the world's worst humanitarian crisis by different bodies. Almost half of Gaza's population

is comprised of children, making the situation one of the most harrowing in modern history.

The scope of Israeli crimes has been spurring mass protests across the world, particularly in Western countries where people think their politicians are also to blame for the catastrophe due to their funding of the regime.

Western states have so far reacted to the protests with unprecedented violence. They have unleashed riot police against peaceful demonstrators in streets as well as schools, using teasers, batons, and pepper spray to disperse crowds. Thousands of people have also been arrested across Europe and the United States under accusations of "antisemitism."

Leaders have also reacted strongly to any criticism of the regime in the media. Several well-established journalists and editors have lost their lives in the past months for simply advocating for the rights of Palestinians as human beings.

The arrest of Biazar comes as a new move by Western politicians who have been unable to exert pressure on him through his workplace, as he is an independent journalist.

Tehran urges boycotting Zionist goods, companies to end Gaza crisis



TEHRAN – In a recent statement, the spokesman for the Iranian Ministry of Foreign Affairs highlighted the urgent need for global action against the ongoing war crimes committed by the Zionist regime against Palestinians.

Nasser Kanaani suggested that boycotting Israeli goods and companies is an easy yet highly effective form of protest.

He emphasized that the inaction of international governments and the United Nations Security Council has exacerbated the situation, thereby increasing the responsibility of nations and non-governmental organizations to support the oppressed Palestinian people.

Kanaani shared his concerns in a note posted on his official social media account on Saturday. He pointed out that it has been 245 days since the Zionist regime began its relentless and deadly attacks on the besieged residents of the Gaza Strip, resulting in the ongoing and painful killing of women and children.

Kanaani elaborated on the severity of the situation, stating, "The most heinous international crimes, including war crimes, crimes against humanity, and acts of genocide, have been perpetrated through the widespread killing of civilians, women, and children."

In his post, the spokesman reiterated the urgency of the situation, criticizing the international community's failure to act.

He stated, "Due to the inaction of governments and the United Nations Security Council in stopping the war crimes of the Zionist regime against Palestinians, the responsibility of nations and non-governmental organizations to support the oppressed Palestinian people increases. Boycotting Zionist goods and companies is the easiest, yet very effective action."

Kanaani's statement calls for immediate and tangible actions from the global community to address the humanitarian crisis in Gaza and support the Palestinian cause.

Palestinian sources reported that at least 15 people were killed in Israeli bombings targeting central Gaza early on Friday.

On Thursday, an Israeli military strike on a UN-RWA school in the Nuseirat refugee camp killed at least 40 Palestinians and injured dozens more.

The UN stated that 6,000 displaced people were sheltering in the building at the time of the at-

"This is state terrorism," said Naiem Khalil, a displaced Palestinian. "Israel is targeting UN institutions, violating international laws, and crossing all red lines. For 76 years, Palestinians have appealed to the world without response. UN resolutions are enforced everywhere except against Israel. This is hypocrisy."

The UN's human right office has said that the Israeli military's failure to ensure "distinction, proportionality and precaution" in its attacks that have killed Palestinian civilians would amount to violations of international humanitarian law.

Israel launched the current offensive against Gaza, targeting hospitals, homes, and places of worship, following a surprise attack by Palestinian Resistance movements, named Operation Al-Agsa Storm, on October 7.

Simultaneously, the regime has imposed a nearly complete blockade on the coastal enclave, severely limiting the supply of essential goods such as food, medicine, electricity, and water to

The conflict has resulted in at least 36,654 Palestinian deaths, most of them women and children, with another 83,309 injured. Over 1.7 million people have been internally displaced during the war.

Diplomat denounces UAE's continued false claims on Persian Gulf Islands



TEHRAN - In a resolute letter to the United Nations Security Council, Iran has categorically dismissed the United Arab Emirates' (UAE) unfounded assertions regarding the Iranian islands of Abu Musa, Greater Tunb, and Lesser Tunb in the Persian Gulf.

Iranian Ambassador to the UN, Saeed Iravani, denounced the allegations as a flagrant violation of the UN Charter and a blatant attempt to interfere in Iran's internal affairs.

"The Islamic Republic of Iran unequivocally rejects and condemns all allegations in the letter and considers the contents of the letter as a flagrant and unjustified interference in its internal affairs, in direct contradiction to the spirit of good neighborliness, and a blatant violation of the fundamental principles of international law and the United Nations Charter, particularly the principles of political sovereignty, independence, and territorial integrity," the Iranian envoy wrote.

"The Islamic Republic of Iran reaffirms its sovereignty over the Iranian islands of Abu

Musa, Greater Tunb, and Lesser Tunb in the Persian Gulf and emphasizes that all decisions and actions taken by its authorities in these Iranian islands have always been, and will continue to be, based on the principle of national sovereignty," Iravani added.

The Iranian envoy implored the UAE to cease its irresponsible and provocative actions. He urged the UAE, as a member of the United Nations, to adhere to the fundamental principles of international law.

"The Islamic Republic of Iran calls on the United Arab Emirates to refrain from such irresponsible and provocative actions and, as a member of the United Nations, respect the principles of independent sovereignty, territorial integrity, and non-interference in the internal affairs of sovereign states that are foundational tenets upon which the United Nations was established.

All member states are required to uphold and observe these principles. Furthermore, these principles are recognized as essential for fostering peaceful relations and cooperation among states," he stated.

Iran is one of the oldest civilizations in the region and the world. Its sovereignty over the Iranian trio islands dates back to the 6th century BCE when the UAE was still hundreds of years away from emerging as a political entity.

The Islands were shortly occupied by British forces in the 1960s, a period that seems to be Abu Dhabi's excuse for arguing sovereignty over the Iranian territories.

Iran acting FM urges U.S. to release Afghanistan's frozen assets

TEHRAN – Ali Bagheri Kani, the acting Iranian Foreign Minister, stressed the urgent need to unfreeze Afghanistan's assets, which have been blocked by the United States.

Bagheri Kani made the remarks in a letter that was read at the beginning of the second meeting of the regional contact group for Afghanistan that kicked off in Tehran on Saturday morning.

During the meeting, Bagheri Kani underscored the critical role of special representatives from China, Russia, Pakistan, and Iran. He expressed optimism that the discussions would lead to constructive proposals for peaceful coexistence among Afghanistan's neighbors and the broader international community.

Bagheri Kani pointed out that nearly three years have passed since the American occupying forces withdrew from Afghanistan. Despite their departure, Afghanistan continues to grapple with significant issues.

He acknowledged some progress made by the interim Afghan government but emphasized that many problems remain unresolved. He attributed these issues to the historical neglect and economic underdevelopment imposed by the

occupying forces and criticized the continued blockade of Afghanistan's assets as a significant hindrance to the country's development.

Reaffirming Iran's commitment, Bagheri Kani highlighted the importance of supporting initiatives for peace, stability, and development in Afghanistan. He cited Iran's active participation in forums such as the Afghanistan Neighboring Countries' Foreign Ministers' Meetings and the Moscow Format, which underscore the collective responsibility of the region to foster a stable Afghan government.

Bagheri Kani emphasized the necessity of regional collaboration, noting that aligning regional values is crucial for forging bilateral and multilateral agreements with Afghanistan. He called on the international community to move beyond merely discussing Afghanistan's problems and to actively propose and implement viable solutions.

Reflecting on the historical context, Bagheri Kani remarked that the current economic hardships and underdevelopment in Afghanistan are largely the result of the occupiers' actions, which destroyed the country's infrastructure and left it in ruins. He asserted that these forces must shoulder their humanitarian responsibilities and contribute to

Afghanistan's economic recovery without political interference.

The acting Foreign Minister also addressed the significant challenge posed by Afghan migration, which exerts pressure on neighboring countries like Iran and Pakistan while depriving Afghanistan of its workforce. He advocated for a responsible mechanism under UN supervision to facilitate the return of Afghan refugees and ensure their dignified reintegration into Afghan society.

Bagheri Kani recognized the interim Afghan government's efforts to form an inclusive government that represents all ethnic groups. He stressed that such inclusivity is vital for Afghanistan's political stability and economic development, a sentiment echoed in declarations from regional and neighboring meetings.

In his concluding remarks, Bagheri Kani highlighted Afghanistan's strategic geographical position, which could make it a key hub for East-West and North-South connectivity. He called for enhanced regional cooperation to develop Afghanistan's infrastructure, benefiting the entire region.

The acting Foreign Minister expressed concern over attempts by some external countries to influ-

ence developments in Afghanistan in ways that undermine its sovereignty. He called for regional unity and collaboration with international organizations and Afghanistan's interim government to prevent further foreign interference.

Reiterating Iran's stance, Bagheri Kani affirmed Iran's full support for constructive initiatives that ensure Afghanistan's peace, stability, sovereignty, and territorial integrity. He urged the United Nations to pay closer attention to the humanitarian conditions in the country, emphasizing the need for a coordinated international effort to address Afghanistan's challenges.

Bagheri Kani highlighted the prolonged conflict, noting that more than eight months of Israeli attacks on Gaza have passed without any concrete action from the international community to halt what he described as "unprecedented crimes."

He accused Israel of using collective punishment policies to achieve a "sinister and dangerous goal" of making Gaza uninhabitable, labeling these actions as clear war crimes and genocide.

Representatives from Iran, Pakistan, Indonesia, Malaysia, Bangladesh, Egypt, and Nigeria attended the D-8 summit to discuss the humanitarian crisis in Gaza. Bagheri Kani called for a unified and strong response from Muslim countries to prevent the continuation of these crimes.

In the statement he issued for the meeting, Bagheri Kani stressed the importance of solidarity among Muslim countries and the utilization of their collective capacities to focus on this issue. He proposed several measures, including cutting political and economic ties with Israel, embargoing Israeli oil and goods, and recognizing the Israeli regime as a terrorist entity. Additionally, he suggested establishing a special international mission to bring Israel's crimes before international courts and called for the revival of UN General Assembly Resolution 3379, which previously equated Zionism with racism.

Highlighting the emphasis placed by Iran's late President and Foreign Minister on strengthening ties, Bagheri reaffirmed Iran's commitment to enhancing bilateral relations with Turkey,

In response, Fidan appreciated Iran's participation in the Istanbul meeting during this sensitive period following the tragic incident on May 19 that resulted in the death of Iranian President and Foreign Minister. He mentioned discussions with the late Foreign Minister Hossein Amir Abdollahian regarding this initiative and the organization of the meeting.

Fidan also highlighted the diverse dimensions of Ankara-Tehran relations, emphasizing the need for continued cooperation in economic, energy, and counterterrorism fields, building on positive agreements reached during presidential visits.

'Iran-Pakistan relation roots in a shared history'

Once again, the WSJ tells some lies and also omits some very important facts. The lie is that Shanbezadeh was not a well-known figure. He had gained some notoriety among anti-Iran Twitter users for insulting religious figures, but he in no way possessed widespread recognition within

What the WSJ doesn't talk about is even more significant than its lies. If Shanbezadeh was merely an ordinary citizen exercising his right to criticize the government, why was he arrested while attempting to illegally cross Iran's border? Why was his Twitter account suspended immediately following his detention? And what did his Telegram messages reveal about his receipt of funds from Israel?

The Thursday op-ed by WSJ may evoke a well-known Persian idiom among Iranian readers. Some are going to read the article and question how the world-renowned newspaper managed to "link Gudarz to Shaqayeq"? that's an expression used to describe the illogical and irrelevant combination of random facts to support a conclusion that lacks a logical basis.

Russia to export coal to India through Iran

TEHRAN – Russia plans to transit coal to India via the International North-South Transit Corridor (INSTC) passing through Iran, IRNA reported.

The announcement regarding the plan was made during the 27th Saint Petersburg International Economic Forum held in the city on Friday.

As reported, the export cargo of Russian coal is going to be shipped to India through Iran via the southern Bandar Abbas port.

The North-South Corridor consists of three route sections, namely East, West, and Middle.

Iran and Russia are also cooperating in the maritime sector to use the Caspian Sea to shorten the transit route from Russia to India.

Last year, the Islamic Republic of Iran Shipping Lines (IRISL) announced that it has assigned 300 containers to transport goods between Russia and India.

The mentioned containers have been allocated to execute the first phase of a program for transiting Russian commodities to India via the North-South Corridor using the Caspian Sea.

"According to the plans made by the Islamic Republic of Iran Shipping Lines, in the first phase, 300 containers have been considered for transporting cargos to Russia, and if the demand increases, the number of these containers will increase continuously," an IRISL statement

With 11 trade ports capable of handling 273 million tons of goods along its northern and southern coasts, a 15,000-km rail network, and over 250,000 km of high-quality roads, the minister said Iran was positioned to facilitate rapid connectivity within regional and global trade networks at minimal expenses.

IRISL to overhaul 50 vessels by March 2025

TEHRAN – The Islamic Republic of Iran Shipping Lines (IRISL) is going to overhaul 50 vessels in the current Iranian calendar year (ends on March 20, 2025), an official with the company said.

According to the managing director of the IRISL overhaul bureau, the company is currently overhauling 13 vessels at its yards, IRNA reported.

The official noted that the IRISL repairs all its ships inside the country using the expertise of local engineers and experts.

According to him, seven of the vessels that are being overhauled by IRISL belong to the company and the rest are owned by the private sector.

Last year, IRISL Managing Director Mohammadreza Modares-Khiabani underlined the significance of self-sufficiency in the development of the country's maritime fleet and said IRISL is going to seriously pursue building new vessels and overhauling the existing ones.

Speaking in a meeting with IRISL's senior managers, Modares-Khiabani underlined supporting the construction of vessels and container ships by domestic manufacturers as one of the main strategies that the IRISL is going to pursue.

"IRISL has begun a serious movement in the field of vessel construction and overhaul using domestic capabilities, which will continue in the current year with more strength and vigor," he said.

Emphasizing the need to provide opportunities for growth and prosperity during the sanctions and international crisis, the official said: "Although sanctions have created difficult conditions for various sectors of the Iranian economy the coun-



try has been able to overcome the pressures by relying on domestic capabilities."

Modares-Khiabani further underlined the importance of human resources and asset management by the IRISL, saying: "Historical records have been achieved by the Islamic Republic of Iran Shipping Lines; however, the continuation of this trend must be accompanied by great strides in the development of the fleet so that new records can be set in this area as well."

"Special attention to the north-south corridor and the strong presence of the shipping fleet of the Islamic Republic of Iran in the port of Chabahar is also among the IRISL's main strategies in the current year," he added.

The IRISL head also mentioned his organization's special efforts for repairing the vessels of the IRISL fleet inside the country and said: "There is a serious approach to conduct the periodic repairs of ships inside the country and so far, effective steps have been taken in this area."

"At the same time, there is a serious emphasis on supplying all the items and parts needed by the vessels by domestic manufacturers," the official

Foreign journalists experience tea culture at Beijing Tea Museum

BEIJING- A number of journalists from some Asian, Pacific, and Latin American countries experienced tea culture at Beijing Tea Museum in Maliandao Tea Street, Xicheng District, Beijing on Wednesday (June 5).

The visit to the museum was organized by the China International Press Communication Center (CIPCC).

During their visit, the journalists tested the taste of different types of Chinese tea, and also enjoyed watching some Chines performances, mostly relate to the tea culture.

Maliandao Tea Street is located in Guang'anmenwai Sub-district of Xicheng District, Beijing. As the largest tea distribution center in northern China, it has been playing a major role in China's tea trade. In 2000, it was recognized by Beijing Municipal Commerce Commission as Beijing's Characteristic Commercial Street, and was honored as the Top Tea Street in Beijing. In 2006, it was certified as a national characteristic commercial street by China Pedestrian Street Working Committee.

The history of Maliandao Tea Street dates back to the mid-1990s. With the support of Xicheng district government and Beijing municipality, profound changes have taken place over the past 20 years. Maliandao has turned from a declining, dirty storage area to a characteristic commercial district with a modern touch and a global reputation.

Maliandao is home to 11 tea trade markets, with more than 1,700 tea merchants and over 4,000 employees. The tea market covers an area of 128,000 m2 and its sales volume in 2021 reached 423.6 million yuan.

There are 1330 comprehensive tea shops, accounting for 78 percent of the total in Maliandao. The remaining 22 percent are specialized tea shops, among which 162 mainly sell white tea in Fujian, 30 sell Da Hong Pao (or Big Red Robe) in Fujian, 21 sell Tie Guan Yin (or Iron Goddess of Mercy) in Fujian, 8 sell Pu'er Tea in Yunnan, 3 sell Zhu Ye Qing (or Bamboo Leaf Green) in Sichuan, 26 sell dark tea in Anhua, while the rest 50 tea shops specialize in other types of tea.

There are about ten major tea brands in Maliandao, including some time-honored ones such as TAETEA, Chen Sheng Hao, Wu Yu Tai, Zhang Yiyuan, Xiangyuan, PINPINTEA, Jinghua Tea, China Tea (Anhua Dark Tea) and Chen Sheng Hao Fu Yuan Chang.

Maliandao currently houses two tea industry associations.

One is Beijing Tea Industry Association, which is affiliated to China Tea Marketing Association. Its members are mostly time-honored tea enterprises in Beijing, and it is run by the retirees of Beijing Capital Agribusiness & Foods Group, a state-owned enterprise.

The other is Beijing Tea Enterprise Chamber of Commerce. Composed of tea enterprises established in the early stage of Maliandao's history, it is an independent legal person. Currently, it has 300 members, most of them are Fujian tea companies.

Tea industry in Maliandao

Maliandao is a commercial district with both wholesale and retail tea business. There are 11 tea markets and over 1,700 tea-related enterprises. Some representative tea markets are Maliandao Tea Market, Jingmin Tea Market, Jinghua Tea World, Jinghuayuan Tea Market, Tianfuyuan Tea Market, Style Tea Market, International Tea Market, Huangshan Tea Market, Jingdinglong Tea Market, Tanyang Kungfu Black Tea Promotion Center and Tea Trade Lifestyle Store. Here tea lovers can find various types of tea from over ten major tea-producing regions in China, such as Fujian, Yunnan, Anhui, Zhejiang, Guizhou, Jiangxi, Sichuan and Taiwan. There are all six major types of tea, namely, black tea, green tea, green tea, yellow tea, dark tea and white tea, and hundreds of varieties from across China.

The significant growth of the tea industry strikes a perfect balance between business and culture in Maliandao, making it a new type of business, a characteristic brand and a great example for China's tea culture. Built on the tea culture and the tea industry, Maliandao plays a leading role in attracting investment and developing regional economy. In just ten years, tea has revitalized Maliandao, making it a household name in the do-

mestic tea industry. Maliandao has become the top tea street of Beijing and a cluster of famous tea brands in China.

Two exhibitions and one festival

In order to boost the economy in Maliandao, the district government launched the "Maliandao International Tea Culture Festival" in 2001. Since then, this event has been held on a yearly basis, which gave a tremendous boost to the regional economy, as well as to the popularity and influence of Maliandao in general. In 2005, Maliandao was officially recognized by Beijing Municipal Commerce Bureau as a "China Characteristic Commercial Street", making it the only national level characteristic commercial street in Beijing at that time. In 2010, it was certified as the "Top Tea Street in China" by China Tea Marketing Association.

Since 2012, China Tea Marketing Association, Xicheng District People's Government and governments of major tea-producing regions in China have been jointly hosting the "International Tea Exhibition, Maliandao International Tea Culture Exhibition & Tea Culture Festival (Promotion)".

Known as "Two Exhibitions and One Festival" for short, this event is themed on "Enjoy the Taste of Tea in Beijing With Friends From Across the World", and is a large-scale celebration approved by the Ministry of Commerce.

As earlier mentioned, the visit to Beijing Tea Museum was organized by the China International Press Communication Center (CIPCC).

CIPCC, under the China Public Diplomacy Association (CPDA), has initiated a program to build a platform for the media from countries around the world, especially developing countries, to observe China and study development in this country.

In each edition of the program, journalists from all around the world gather together to get familiar with the modern China and exchange their experiences in the field of journalism.

In 2024 edition of the program, started in late February, over 100 journalists from more than 90 countries are participating.

Child killers: Israel side by side with ISIL

TEHRAN - Israel has been dealt another major international blow as it is set to join a UN blacklist that has already included terror groups such as ISIL, al-Qaeda and Boko Haram.

On Friday, Stephane Dujarric, the spokesman of United Nations Secretary-General Antonio Guterres, announced that his boss has added the Israeli military to the annual "list of shame", which is a global list of offenders that have committed violations against children.

Israel's inclusion on the list comes more than eight months after the regime of Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu declared war on Gaza.

Israeli savagery

Israel has slaughtered more than 36,800 Palestinians since the war erupted on October 7 following a surprise military operation by Hamas in southern Israel.

According to the Health Ministry in the Gaza Strip, more than 15,500 Palestinian children are among those who have been butchered by Israel.

Doctors in Gaza have reported that an alarming number of Palestinian children have lost limbs due to Israel's genocidal war on the besieged Palestinian territory. They say up to 3,000 children have lost one or two limbs over the past eight months.

Many children are undergoing amputations without anaesthetic as Israel has largely restricted the entry of medicines to the Gaza Strip.

The World Food Program and the Food and Agriculture Organization warned in a joint report on Wednesday that over one million Palestinians in Gaza could experience the highest level of starvation by the middle of next month if Israel continues the Gaza onslaught. They added that hunger is worsening because of heavy restrictions on humanitarian access and the collapse of the local food system in Gaza.

Important step

The Palestinian ambassador to the United Nations said the inclusion of Israel on the "list of shame does not restore the lives of children who were killed or left permanently disabled in the regime's military strikes."

Riyad Mansour, however, hoped the UN move would help end Israel's impunity in the face of its crimes against Palestin-

"But it is an important step in



the right direction towards ending the double standards and the culture of impunity Israel has enjoyed for far too long and that left our children vulnerable," Mansour said on X.

Long overdue

The UN's expert on human rights in the occupied Palestinian territory welcomed the UN move but said it is long overdue.

Francesca Albanese said in a post on X, "It should have not taken 15,000 children killed, many more mutilated [and] 20,000 orphaned, to list Israel among the states who commit heinous violations of [international] law against children."

Al-Aqsa Hospital 'looks like a slaughterhouse'

A pediatric intensive care doctor with Doctors Without Borders, known by its French initials MSF, told Al Jazeera that the emergency department at Al-Aqsa Hospital "is a complete bloodbath ... it looks like a slaughterhouse".

"The images and videos that I've received show patients lying everywhere in pools of blood ... their limbs have been blown off," Dr Tanya Haj-Hassa added.

"That is what a massacre looks like.

It means parents running around caring for their children who have blood running from their head trying to find a medic to treat them. But it's so chaotic and there's so many patients that is vastly outnumbering the healthcare ability to care for them."

Israeli forces launch 'unprecedented brutal attack' on Nuseirat

Gaza's Government Media Office said the Israeli forces have launched "an unprecedented brutal attack on the Nuseirat refugee camp", leaving dozens of people dead and wounded in the streets.

"[It] continues its aggression against all areas of the Central Governorate [Deir el-Balah], and Al-Aqsa Martyrs Hospital is in a catastrophic situation," it said.

Israeli forces launched "a barbaric and brutal aggression" in the camp, directly targeting civilians, the office said, adding that ambulances and civil defense cannot reach the area due to the intensity of the

The office warned that Al-Agsa Martyrs Hospital is the only hospital in Deir el-Balah currently working on only one electric generator; if the sole generator stops, "a real disaster" will ensue.

"This hospital provides health services to a million people and displaced persons, and it cannot accommodate this large number of martyrs and injuries," it said.

It called on the international community, the UN and all international organizations "to intervene immediately and urgently save the hospital and save the health situation in the Central Governorate".

"We hold the [Israeli] occupation and the American administration fully responsible for this catastrophic crime in which the blood of dozens of innocent civilians was shed," it

"We call on the international community and all international organizations to stop this brutal aggression continued by the 'Israeli' occupation, and we demand that they stop the genocidal war immediately and urgently."

TEHRAN - Fars province's cultural heritage directorate is embarking on a project to restore and preserve the ruins of Sarvestan palace, which dates from the Sassanid era (224 CE to 651).

On Friday, the provincial tourism chief Mohammad Sabet-Eglidi, during his visit to the UNESCO World Heritage site emphasized the importance of preserving this magnificent monument.

Sabet-Eqlidi highlighted that the historical site is set to undergo significant restoration and protective measures, backed by an allocation from provincial and national funds.

He further elaborated that with funding from both provincial and national sources, the restoration project will commence, and new welfare amenities will be constructed for the convenience of visitors.

Sabet-Eqlidi highlighted that promoting employment in Sarvestan is feasible through investment in tourism, underscoring the necessity of implementing innovative plans for the development of tourism in the county.

The Sarvestan Palace, located in Sarvestan country of Fars province, is a remarkable testament to Sassanid architecture and Persian heritage. The palace serves as an architectural marvel showcasing the grandeur and sophistication of the ancient Persian civilization.

The Sarvestan Sassanid Palace consists of a central hall flanked by two symmetrical chambers and surrounded by a perimeter wall. The main hall, adorned with elaborate stucco decorations and inscriptions, is a testament to the Sassanid artisans' mastery of craftsmanship.

Part of a UNESCO-registered ensemble, the palace has long fascinated archaeologists, architects, and historians of art for its extraordinary architectural elements.

In 2018, UNESCO added an ensemble of Sassanian historical cities in southern Iran -- titled "Sassanid Archaeological Landscape of Fars Region" -- to its World Heritage list. The ensemble is comprised of eight archaeological sites situated in three geographical parts of Firuzabad, Bishapur, and Sarvestan. It reflects the optimized utilization of natural topography and bears witness to the influence of Achaemenid and Parthian cultural traditions and of Roman art, which later had a significant impact on the architecture and artistic styles of the Islamic era.

The Sassanid era is of very high importance in the history of Iran. Under Sassanids, Persian art and architecture experienced a general renaissance. Architecture often took grandiose proportions such as palaces at Ctesiphon, Firuzabad, and

Sarvestan which are amongst the highlights of the ensemble.

Crafts such as metalwork and gem-engraving grew highly sophisticated, yet scholarship was encouraged by the state. In those years, works from both the East and West were translated into Pahlavi, the language of the Sassanians. Rockcarved sculptures and bas-reliefs on abrupt limestone cliffs are widely deemed as characteristics and striking relics of Sassanian art, top examples of which can be traced at Bishapur, Naqsh-e Rostam, and Nagsh-e Rajab in southern Iran.

Experts believe that efforts to preserve and restore the Sarvestan Sassanid Palace are crucial for safeguarding this invaluable piece of Persian history and ensuring that future generations can continue to marvel at its beauty and architectural

From palaces to shrines: the brilliance of Iranian mirror work

TEHRAN - In the heart of Iran's architectural history lies a shimmering tradition which not only decorates but also enlightens the spaces it adorns. It is the ancient art of mirror work, which is known for its dazzling display of light and intricate mosaics.

That remarkable skill is widely known as a testament to Iran's innovative spirit in interior decoration. It is an art form involving the arrangement of small or large pieces of mirror mosaics, which helps transform interiors into luminous wonders.

By reflecting and multiplying light, these decorations elevate the aesthetic appeal of architectural spaces, creating an interplay of light and form that is both mesmerizing and practical.

As mentioned by Visit Iran, evidence of Iran's longstanding relationship with glasswork dates back to the Parthian and Sassanid ears, where numerous glass artifacts have been uncovered. This deep-rooted tradition suggests that the intricate mirror work seen today is a continuation of ancient practices, refined over centuries to achieve its current form.

In Iranian culture, mirrors and water symbolize purity, fortune, honesty, and light. This symbolism is possibly why mirrors became a favored medium in Iranian decorative arts.

Initially, mirror work involved installing large, one-piece mirror panels in buildings. A prominent example is the Chehel Sotoun (Forty Columns) palace in Isfahan, where a large mirror once reflected the image of those entering the palace.

Over time, however, the size of the mirror pieces diminished, giving rise to more complex designs composed of smaller fragments.

The 19th century marked a significant period for mirror work's popularity in the country. In that period, fine mirror pieces were cut into desired shapes and assembled into intricate mosaics, allowing artists to blend those materials with local craft skills.

The Qajar era saw a renaissance in Iranian architecture, despite an overall decline in architectural innovation. During the reign of Naser al-Din Shah of Qajar, Western artistic influences merged

with traditional Iranian styles, leading to a resurgence in the arts, including stucco, mirror work, and mosaics. Royal buildings and shrines were adorned with elaborate mirror work, enhancing their grandeur and spiritual ambiance.

By the late 19th century, mirror pieces were often cut into small triangles, diamonds, or hexagons. Convex glasses, turned into mirrors, also became popular, adding depth and dimension to

Mirror work in the Qajar epoch reached its zenith with the creation of ornate patterns such as muqarnas, arabesques, and calligraphic inscriptions on mirrors. The Mirror Hall of Golestan Palace and Shams-ol-Emarat stand as iconic examples of this artistic pinnacle. These structures, along with many others in Shiraz, Isfahan, and Tehran, highlight the enduring legacy and unmatched artistry of Iranian mirror work.

Today, sightseers visiting historical mosques, palaces, and mansions may enjoy a dance of eternal brilliance through shimmering reflections of mirror work.

The UN Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) reported that at least 60,000 people have been affected by recent floods in the provinces of Baghlan, Badakhshan, and Takhar.

Citing the Taliban-run refugee ministry, OCHA revealed that nearly 350 people have died in these floods while over 1,500 others have been injured.

The first plane carrying humanitarian cargo to those affected by the recent flood in Afghanistan landed in Mazar-e-Sharif on May 23, IRCS website quoted Razieh Alishvandi, the IRCS director for international affairs, as saying.

The donated goods included tents, blankets, and foodstuff.

More than half of the 600,000 people affected by the floods are children, Save the Children reported in a statement, adding that it is sending a 'clinic on wheels' with mobile health and child protection teams to support children and their families."

Taliban spokesperson Zabihullah Mujahid has also expressed sorrow over the catastrophic floods, acknowledging the significant loss of life and widespread devastation. The Taliban has mobilized resources to assist in rescue and relief efforts, but the scale of the disaster presents significant challenges.

The international community has rallied to support Afghanistan in its time of need, with humanitarian organizations and neighboring countries offering assistance. However, the road to recovery will be long and arduous for a nation already grappling with the aftermath of decades of conflict and instability.

Iraq welcomes branches of Iranian universities

TEHRAN – Iraqi Minister of Higher Education and Scientific Research, Naeem Al-Aboudi, has welcomed Iranian universities to open branches in Iraq.

"We are interested in boosting collaborations in areas such as artificial intelligence and nanotechnology. We also support sisterhood agreements between universities of the two countries," Al-Aboudi said.

The official made the remarks in a meeting with the head of Iran's Islamic Culture and Relations Organization (ICRO), Mohammad-Mehdi Imanipour, on Friday.

Al-Aboudi also expressed willingness to admit Iranian students to Iraqi universities, IRNA reported.

Imanipour, for his part, highlighted the significance of enhancing educational ties and conducting joint scientific research calling it essential for making a shared future.

Supporting knowledge-based centers is one of the ways to develop science and technology in Iraq, he stressed.

The official went on to suggest boosting cooperation between the Iraqi Ministry of Higher Education and the Iranian Vice Presidency for Science and Technology.

Iran-Iraq science week

The second Iran-Iraq science week, which was supposed to be held in Karbala, is currently postponed due to the martyrdom of late President Ebrahim Raisi and Foreign Minister Hossein Amir Abdollahian, alongside other officials.

The first Iran–Iraq Science Week was hosted by the Iranian city of Mashhad from October 9 to 12, 2023.

Representatives of over 60 universities and educational institutions attended the event.

Hosted by Ferdowsi University, this scientific event aimed to develop diplomatic interactions, academic relations, and cultural exchange.

"The development of academic cooperation and the exchange of scientific knowledge and modern technologies is one of the main goals of holding this 5-day conference," IRNA quoted Vahid Haddadi-Asl, the Iranian deputy science minister for international affairs, as saying.

He stressed the importance of exchanging experiences and expertise and formulating scientific understandings in many files, some of which relate to the environmental aspect and joint educational programs.

Mohammad Kafi, chancellor of Ferdowsi University, for his part, explained that the universities of the two countries are keen to take successful steps of joint talks and reach a vision that serves the scientific and research side between the two countries.

Meanwhile, the Iraqi Undersecretary for Scientific Research Affairs, Haider Abed Dahud, who headed the delegation of the Ministry of Higher Education and Scientific Research, said that the science week between the two countries summarizes the level of understanding and coordination resulting from the agreement between the Iraqi Ministry of Higher Education

and Scientific Research and the Ministry of Science, Research and Technology in the Islamic Republic of Iran and completes the dialogues that took place in Baghdad, the University of Baghdad's website reported.

To expand and promote scientific and technological relations implement joint research projects and develop joint cooperation between the scientific and research centers of the two countries, memorandums of understanding are signed, the Iraqi news agency (INA) reported.

"The memorandums of understanding included a number of cooperation files, including research opportunities for graduates, joint supervision and development of the post-doctoral path, as well as the exchange of students between universities and mutual fellowship in various specializations, cultural, artistic and sports programs, and joint research projects, in addition to benefiting from laboratory services and logistical equipment at the universities of the two countries," INA quoted the website of the Iraqi Ministry of Higher Education and Scientific Research, as saving.

"The memorandums also included scientific cooperation in the field of training, and the exchange of scientific consultations related to curricula and academic courses, while it was agreed to form a committee from both parties to coordinate, follow up, and facilitate implementation procedures."

The scientific and academic centers of the two countries would hold meetings and webinars to trace, examine, and resolve the existing challenges by exchanging views.

Also, joint academic committees would be formed to follow up on the implementation of the memorandums of understanding.

Boosting educational co-op

In May 2023, Al-Aboudi said many Iraqi youths are interested in continuing their higher education in Iran.

Now the demand for studying in Iran is very high and a large number of Iraqi students are interested in continuing their higher education in Iran as a friendly and neighboring country, he added.

The Iraqi official made the remarks in a meeting in Tehran with Iran's Minister of Science, Research, and Technology, Mohammad-Ali Zolfigol, IRNA reported.

He pointed out that some 75,000 Iraqi nationals are currently studying in Iranian universities.

"The scientific abilities and capacities of the two countries require that we boost cooperation in the field of science and research, and in this field, we need detailed planning and the formation of special working groups," Al-Aboudi highlighted.

Zolfigol, for his part, while emphasizing the need to increase joint scientific exchanges between Iran and Iraq and holding joint seminars, said holding a joint meeting between heads of universities and research and technology centers of the two countries can help increase cooperation.

Marriage rate declines in two months yr/yr

TEHRAN –In the first two months of the current Iranian year which started on March 20, a total of 81,428 marriages were registered in the country, indicating a 9 percent decline compared to 89,088 marriages in the same period last year.

According to the Civil Registration Organization, 28,834 divorces were registered in the same two-month period, showing a two percent increase in comparison to 28,355 last year, ISNA

Wedding, childbearing loans

From the beginning of the current year until April 29, the Central Bank paid 56.38 trillion rials (almost \$94 million) in wedding and childbearing loans.

Some 40.84 trillion rials (about \$68 million) were granted to the applicants for wedding loans, an increase of 28 percent compared to the same period last year, IRNA quoted Mehdi Sahabi, an official with the Central Bank, as saying.

The Central Bank also paid a total of 15.54 trillion rials (roughly \$26 million) to families in childbearing loans, showing a 23 percent rise year on year.

Protecting the youth

On January 28, late President Ebrahim Raisi urged relevant bodies to take action to protect the youth of the country.

The official told organizations that they can use their facilities and capacities to implement the law to protect the youth.

He pointed to the important role of cultural development in encouraging people to have children, saying that the wrong cultural development in recent decades has been one of the most important reasons for the decrease in the country's population growth.

To address this issue, he called on national media, print and digital media, education, and higher education centers, and advertising agencies to work together to promote positive cultural messages about family planning.

The late president also outlined several other measures that should be taken to protect the youth, including eliminating obstacles to infertility treatment, facilitating marriage by providing timely marriage loans, and providing employment and housing.

Population growth policies

According to the national center for monitoring population policies, from 2001 to 2015, the number of births has been increasing in the country, but after 2015, the number of births started to decrease with an almost steep slope.

In 2020, the number of births in the country (1,114,000) decreased by more than 29 percent



compared to 2015 (1,570,000), a decrease of more than 450,000 births, which was unprecedented in the last few decades.

The number of births in the year 2021 (1,116,000) also shows an increase of about 2,000 compared to the year 2020.

Also, the rate of births from about 20 per thousand population in 2015 has reached its lowest level in the last 50 years with a significant decrease to 13.24 per thousand population in 2021.

The population growth rate reached 0.73 percent in 2020 and 0.68 percent in 2021 despite an increase of 2,000 births compared to 2020.

In Iran, about 10.5 percent of the population was over 60 years old in 2020. In 2050, the population over 60 years is forecast to increase to 33 percent.

In 2030, the population over 65 years is forecast to increase to about 10 percent.

\$7b to be allocated to retrofit, rebuild flood-devastated houses

A budget of 290 trillion rials (nearly \$7 billion) will be allotted to reconstruct and repair housing units destructed by flood in 18 provinces across the country, Mehdi Jamalinejad, deputy interior minister for urban and rural development has announced.

Flood has devastated some 169,377 housing units, 68,333 of which are beyond repair and must be reconstructed, he stated.

Moreover, household appliances of 109,832 families also have suffered damages, he further regretted.

He went on to say that 20,000 housing units, undergone devastation by recent flooding in Aq-Oala county in northern Golestan province, are under construction.

Violin player, instructor Minoo Oftadeh passes away



TEHRAN-Renowned Iranian violin player and instructor Minoo Oftadeh passed away in Tehran on June 6 at the age of 66 after enduring a long period of illness.

Born in May 1958, she entered the National Music Conservatory at the age of 10. She specialized in the violin. During her high school years, she also learned to play the piano and the tombak. Afterwards, she joined the Faculty of Fine Arts at the University of Tehran, ISNA reported.

From the age of 16, she actively participated in the Culture and Arts Orchestra, the Women's Orchestra, and the tombak group under the supervision of maestro Mohammad Esmaeil. She performed extensively in various cities across Iran and also taught violin and kamancheh (spike fiddle) at the Center for Preservation and Promotion of Music at the IRIB.

Following the 1979 Islamic Revolution, Oftadeh continued her musical endeavors, participating in several musical groups and recording soundtracks. She also held concerts both within and outside the country. Recently, she focused more on teaching at the Music Faculty and the Roudaki Foundation, as well as conducting classes at reputable institutions.

The funeral procession for Oftadeh took place on Friday at Behesht-e Zahra Cemetery in south of Tehran and she was buried in the Artists' Section.

Arash the Archer, a legendary figure in Iranian mythology, is a heroic archer who is said to have set the boundary between Iran and Turan with his arrow. According to folklore, Arash launched an arrow from the top of a mountain, putting his own life in its launch. The arrow traveled for days,


eventually landing on the other side of the Oxus River, hundreds of miles away from the original launch site.

The story of Arash's origins is complex, with various sources suggesting that the name "Arash" may be derived from the Parthian dynasty's name "Arsaces". However, one mythological account suggests that Arash descends from Kai Kobad, a king of the Parthian dynasty.

In the myth, Arash is tasked with firing an arrow to mark the boundary between Iran and Turan. He is given a special bow and arrow by an angel, and at dawn, he fires the arrow, which travels a great distance before landing and marking the future border between the two nations. The distance the arrow travels varies depending on the source, with some accounts suggesting it traveled over 1,000 leagues or 40 days' walk.

Despite the variations in the story, Arash remains a popular figure in Iranian mythology and culture. His name is still commonly used among Iranians, and his legend has been retold and reinterpreted in various forms of Iranian literature



The film won the VPRO Big Screen Award at the International Film Festival Rotterdam in the Netherlands last February.





The 2023 drama "Achilles" tells the story of a young filmmaker who currently works in a hospital and takes a mental patient out for a short ride to find out who she really is. Now he has to decide whether to run away with her or take her back to the hospital.

A joint production of Iran, France, and Germany, Delaram's feature debut has been shot on various locations; it takes the audience from the capital Tehran to the dried-up Lake Urmia in the northwest of the country, to the Caspian Sea in the north, and to Maku, near Turkey's border. At the time of the tragedy, there were ten more people on board than the vessel could hold. One of the victims was nine-year-old Anita, from whose perspective we follow the story.

The documentary "A Band of Dreamers and a Judge" by Hesam Eslami and the short film "It Turns Blue" by Shadi Karamroudi are also among the Iranian productions at this year's edition of the festival.

"A Band of Dreamers and a Judge" is a co-production between Iran and France, this film delves into the legend surrounding the mountains of Savadkooh in northern Iran.

A writing for Gaza that defies censorship

CHEAP – the public art project born in Bologna in 2013 - returns to the streets with a powerful and provocative initiative. This time, the collective is collaborating with Johanna Toruño, an artist originally from El Salvador and creator of "The Unapologetic Street Series," to bring a series of posters to the city's walls. But the most incisive part of the initiative are eight posters, the result of a synergy between CHEAP and Toruño, which compose the words "FREE GAZA".

According to the Collater.al Magazine, the clear and direct message does not go unnoticed. Shortly after posting, the words "GAZA" are erased by an anonymous person, who also attempts to erase "FREE." The violent and intimidating gesture is not slow to elicit reactions.

Many citizens turn to CHEAP to report the act of vandalism, sharing a sense of outrage and aggression over the incident. Determined not to be intimidated, CHEAP members reprint the posters with the intention of restoring the original writing. However, when they arrive at the site to put up the new posters, they find a surprise: someone has rewritten "GAZA" in white, over the black with which it had been covered.

In the face of this gesture of resistance and solidarity, CHEAP decides not to put up the new posters. The anonymous rewriting represents a form of conflict and care that perfectly reflects the spirit of the city and the community.

It is a demonstration of the power of public art to provoke dialogue and action, turning an act of censorship into a symbol of hope and resilience.

It has been eight months since the start of the 2023 Israel-Hamas war, which began Oct. 7. The enclave of more than 2 million people has largely been sealed off since the war began; so too has critical access to water, electricity, food and medicine, leaving most of the population displaced and more than half facing catastrophic hunger, according to a U.N.backed report. More than 37,000 Palestinians have been reported killed in Gaza, about half of them women and children.

On top of the human toll in

Gaza, Israeli forces have leveled more than 360,000 structures - homes, schools, mosques and other buildings. An ongoing satellite analysis by two academic researchers that started shortly after the war began, shows how quickly and widespread the destruction of buildings has been in Gaza, particularly in the north, where more than 70% of the buildings have been damaged or destroyed.

The Committee to Protect Journalists has reported that at least 95 journalists and media workers have been killed in the war. Ninety were Palestinian. At least 16 journalists were reported injured and four were reported
